Our National Center provides education and training opportunities for individuals and groups involved in providing substance abuse treatment and counseling, including health professionals in primary prevention and treatment for substance abuse. We are housed in the University of lowa College of Public Health, but offer services nationwide for consulting, technical assistance, and continuing education seminars. We focus specifically on the American Indian and Alaska Native (AI & AN) communities.


The center also includes the Tribal Opioid Response program that aims to address the opioid crisis in tribal communities by increasing access to culturally appropriate and evidence-based treatment.

COVID-19 required a swift mobilization to a virtual format for all of our programs. The center produces 25 virtual initiatives, events, and support services per month to maintain connection with our grantees, other providers, tribal communities, and regional centers around the United States.




