SATTC's Faith-Based Strategic Initiative Newest

SATTC is continuing to bridge the gap between community providers, and faith-based leaders in the southeast region. Thus far in the past 8 months, SATTC has ventured into 3 states within the southeast region to conduct listening sessions, revitalized the coveted Faith Leadership Academy, and continues to provide technical assistance to faith-leaders based on their level of readiness to become leading catalyst for change in addressing substance use concerns in their communites of faith.





ASKING THE EXPERT

Whats to come in the southeast region

Ask the Expert is one of SATTC's newest projects and we are off to a great start! Ask the Expert was created out of the need to continue to provide the substance use and addiction workforce with opportunities to have candid conversations and get real time guidance from experts leading in their area of expertise.

SATTC piloted a podcast last summer in 2019 and upon the conclusion of the season we wanted to continue to create spaces for the known need to share information and resources. We spend a hour each month opening the door to conversations thus far on stigmatizing language, dealing with the addiction crisis centered in community based support, and the integration of SUD and mental health services into primary care. We invite new topics and new session host to drum up worth while conversations to continue to increase the knowledge of SUDs and emerging hot topics in the field.

SATTC's Faith-Based Strategic Initiative Newest

The Faith Leadership Academy (FLA) 2020 cohort has been selected and 15 dynamic faith leaders and substance use professionals will go through an intensive 6 month journey. The FLA will take the cohort through a enriched curriculum that includes a leadership assessment, action learning, and a culminating capstone project for recovery month.

Our 2020 cohort represents over 7 states , including 6 states within the southeast region that SATTC serves. The cohort comprises the brightest of the substance use field such as peer specialist, chaplains, social workers, registered nurses, addiction counselors, and a multitude of pastors and clergy.

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Recovery is real and treatment does work! We want our communities to absorb the passion we have.

Let's Have the Conversation: One Voice, One Mission has many projects to look out for. SATTC will continue to improve and add to the initial faith toolkit made available to the region and network and eager to implement new strategies to increase the SUD workforce capacity within the faith settings and more. PRESERVICE PROFESSIONAL HBCU COLLABORATION



On SATTC's Horizon

SATTC aims to stay on the curve of innovative ways to engage our communities we serve. One of the newest projects SATTC has focused on is providing resources and research to preservice professionals while collaborating with historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs).

Through preliminary research, we have found there is a concerning shortage of younger behavioral health professionals, specifically African Americans. SATTC is providing a field perspective through workforce development and college targeted products. We have divided the collaboration into three specific areas of focus with the following goals: providing workforce development resources on substance use and addiction career pathways (HBCU/high school), raising awareness of SATTC's presence as a leading resource for providers and academia regarding substance use disorders (pop-up table exhibiting), and collaborating with academic institutions to provide the tools/strategies for the infusion of substance use training into primary curriculum (faculty infusion packets).

This year from the Preservice Professional HBCU Collaboration be on the look out for peer-reviewed journal articles, toolkits, collaborative events and more. We want to keep millennials and Gen Zers engaged! *Review a related product from the Mental Health ATTC <u>HERE</u>.*

MINORITY TO PRIORITY: BECOMING THE LEADING EXPERT


We are proud of the splash we have made with our special population strategic initiative thus far. From products to collaborations, Minority to Priority is determined to turn on the spotlight to why African Americans are important in addressing substance use and retention into treatment. We have developed initial products on what is means to be an African American, evidence based strategies, implicit racial bias and microagression.

On the horizon for the initiative is a multitude of projects including issue briefs, an expert roundtable, published research, collaborative efforts with Morehouse School of Medicine, and center developed infographics.

UNDERSTANDING TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

The ATTCs support national and regional activities focused on preparing tools needed by practitioners to improve the quality of service delivery and to providing intensive technical assistance to provider organizations to improve their processes and practices in the delivery of effective SUD treatment and recovery services.



Technical assistance services are defined as negotiated series of activities designed to reach a valued outcome. Technical Assistance (TA) falls into one of the following:

Universal - is information provided to independent users through their own initiative, resulting in minimal interaction with ATTC staff.

Targeted - is based on needs common to multiple recipients and not extensively individualized. A relationship is established between the TA recipient and one or more ATTC staff.

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Intensive - requires a stable, ongoing relationship between the ATTC program staff and the TA recipient and is provided in accordance with a plan developed between the ATTC and the TA recipient. Intensive TA should result in changes to policy, program, practice, or operations that support increased recipient capacity of improved outcomes at one or more systems levels.]
