

Overview

Ohio is among the top five states with the highest rates of opioid-related overdose deaths. In 2016, there were 3,613 opioid-related overdose deaths in Ohio—a rate of 32.9 deaths per 100,000 persons and more than double the national rate of 13.3 deaths per 100,000. Since 2010, the rate has tripled from 10 deaths per 100,000. In the same period, the number of heroin-related deaths increased from 355 to 1,478 deaths, and deaths related to synthetic opioids rose from 175 to 2,296 deaths (information via NIH).

Infrastructure

The Single State Authority for Substance Abuse Services is the Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services (MHAS). In 2011, Ohio Gov. John R. Kasich established the e Governor's Cabinet Opiate Action Team to fight opiate abuse. In 2019, new Gov. Mike Dewine announced the RecoveryOhio Advisory Council.

OhioMHAS administers the Substance Abuse Block Grant from SAMHSA, and awards funds to providers and county ADAMH Boards for local services. Ohio received \$26,060,502 for Year 1 of the grant and the same amount for the second year.

State Opioid Response Program
Rx Abuse Leadership Initiative (RALI) Ohio is an alliance of local, state and national organizations focused on providing tools to enable the safe disposal of unused prescription medicines and raising awareness of the warning signs of opioid misuse.
Launched in February of 2019.

<u>Project DAWN</u>: (Deaths Avoided with Naloxone): a community-based overdose education and naloxone distribution program

<u>Take Charge Ohio</u>: public awareness campaign aimed at prescribers.

The Ohio Opioid Technology Challenge: a three-phase, prize-based competition to find technology-based solutions that address or improve opioid abuse prevention, treatment and overdose avoidance and response.

Ohio Automated Rx Reporting System (OARRS) collects information on all outpatient prescriptions for opioids dispensed by Ohio-licensed pharmacies and Ohio prescribers.
