In this one day training you will learn strategies to help break intergenerational patterns of addiction. Topics include risk factors and pathways of intergenerational addiction, unique risks for children of parents with substance use disorders, co-occurring conditions and trauma as risk factors, the impact of siblings on the intergenerational transmission of addiction, and parenting practices and cultural rituals that help reduce intergenerational transmission of addiction.
