- Sitting Bulls horses: they stole them and sold them. They experienced trauma.


Sunka Wankan


Sunka Wakan have been beside us for years. They know things about us that we don't know about, are we humble enough to learn.

The Sides of a Horse

A horse has five sides which are the five phases of life.

- Right shoulder represents infant
- Right hind represents adolescents
- Tail is the right of passage
- Left hind represents the adult
- Left shoulder represents the elder





Sunka wankan teach the message of the mirror concept, Circular vs. Linear thinking. We need both. Learn about responding vs. reacting. Horses teaches us how to take care of ourselves. After they help someone, they would roll, and stand and shake themselves off.
